



USACE completes first phase of planting project on two rivers

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) has completed the first round of a project to plant willow poles along several miles of the Sacramento and San Joaquin rivers. The poles help repair levee erosion and provide habitat for threatened fish species.
