Data are based on a sample and are subject to sampling variability. The degree of uncertainty for an estimate arising from sampling variability is represented through the use of a margin of error. The value shown here is the 90 percent margin of error. The margin of error can be interpreted roughly as providing a 90 percent probability that the interval defined by the estimate minus the margin of error and the estimate plus the margin of error (the lower and upper confidence bounds) contains the true value. In addition to sampling variability, the ACS estimates are subject to nonsampling error (for a discussion of nonsampling variability, see Accuracy of the Data). The effect of nonsampling error is not represented in these tables.

There were changes in the edit between 2009 and 2010 regarding Supplemental Security Income (SSI) and Social Security. The changes in the edit loosened restrictions on disability requirements for receipt of SSI resulting in an increase in the total number of SSI recipients in the American Community Survey. The changes also loosened restrictions on possible reported monthly amounts in Social Security income resulting in higher Social Security aggregate amounts. These results more closely match administrative counts compiled by the Social Security Administration.

Workers include members of the Armed Forces and civilians who were at work last week.

Industry codes are 4-digit codes and are based on the North American Industry Classification System 2007. The Industry categories adhere to the guidelines issued in Clarification Memorandum No. 2, "NAICS Alternate Aggregation Structure for Use By U.S. Statistical Agencies," issued by the Office of Management and Budget.

Census occupation codes are 4-digit codes and are based on the Standard Occupational Classification (SOC). The Census occupation codes for 2010 and later years are based on the 2010 revision of the SOC. To allow for the creation of 2007-2011 and 2009-2011 tables, occupation data in the multiyear files (2007-2011 and 2009-2011) were recoded to 2011 Census occupation codes. We recommend using caution when comparing data coded using 2011 Census occupation codes with data coded using Census occupation codes prior to 2010. While the 2007-2011 American Community Survey (ACS) data generally reflect the December 2009 Office of Management and Budget (OMB) definitions of metropolitan and micropolitan statistical areas; in certain instances the names, codes, and boundaries of the principal cities shown in ACS tables may differ from the OMB definitions due to differences in the effective dates of the geographic entities.

Estimates of urban and rural population, housing units, and characteristics reflect boundaries of urban areas defined based on Census 2000 data. Boundaries for urban areas have not been updated since Census 2000. As a result, data for urban and rural areas from the ACS do not necessarily reflect the results of ongoing urbanization.

5. An '***' entry in the margin of error column indicates that the median falls in the lowest interval or upper interval of an open-ended distribution. A statistical test is not appropriate.
6. An '*****' entry in the margin of error column indicates that the estimate is controlled. A statistical test for sampling variability is not appropriate.

Dear George:

The California Department of Public Health requested that Rural Community Assistance Corporation (RCAC) perform an income survey of the North Fork – Madera County Maintenance District (MD) #8 in Madera, California. The purpose of this survey is to establish a median household income (MHI) level for grant and loan funding programs and sources. This survey has been completed and the results are attached (see Chart 1, page 2).

The MHI for North Fork – Madera County MD #8 is **\$20,999** with a response rate of **90 percent**.

North Fork – Madera County MD #8 has 110 parcels; 24 are commercial, 35 are vacant homes or lots; two (2) are vacation homes; leaving 49 parcels (households) to survey. The number of households in a range between one (1) and 55 requires a sample size of 90 percent to meet State and Federal guidelines.

*The 37 responses account for a **75.5 percent response rate**. Normally, a 90 percent response rate is encouraged for systems of this size. RCAC contacted CDPH and together they determined that even if the remaining seven (7) households (needed to obtain the 90% response rate) had responded with an income of more than \$58,554, the system would still qualify as disadvantaged.*

The MHI is based on a 90 percent response rate, as if the remaining seven households had reported incomes of more than \$58,554.

The survey was designed and conducted per State and Federal guidelines established for the California State Revolving Loan Fund. Currently, the California statewide MHI is determined to be \$58,724. Disadvantaged households are set at 80 percent of the statewide MHI (80% of \$58,724 = \$46,979).



There were changes in the edit between 2009 and 2010 regarding Supplemental Security Income (SSI) and Social Security. The changes in the edit loosened restrictions on disability requirements for receipt of SSI resulting in an increase in the total number of SSI recipients in the American Community Survey. The changes also loosened restrictions on possible reported monthly amounts in Social Security income resulting in higher Social Security aggregate amounts. These results more closely match administrative counts compiled by the Social Security Administration.

Workers include members of the Armed Forces and civilians who were at work last week.

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Estimates of urban and rural population, housing units, and characteristics reflect boundaries of urban areas defined based on Census 2000 data. Boundaries for urban areas have not been updated since Census 2000. As a result, data for urban and rural areas from the ACS do not necessarily reflect the results of ongoing urbanization.

FAIRMEAD INCOME SURVEY NARRATIVE (2008)

Introduction

The Madera County unincorporated community of Fairmead is located just east of Highway 99 approximately four miles south of the City of Chowchilla. The Madera County Maintenance District #33 provides water to about 170 households and roughly 687 people.

Madera County Maintenance District #33 has only one production water well and a backup well at the Fairmead School to provide potable water to the community of Fairmead.

Purpose

Fairmead is located in the 2000 Madera County Census Tract 2, Block Group 4. This census tract block group is over 40 square miles in area. Concerns were expressed regarding the pertinence of census data from such a large area and how representative the census actually was of Fairmead's residents' economic status. To more accurately determine resident characteristics, a community income survey was considered necessary.

The purpose of the survey was to determine the size and incomes of households in the community utilizing the community water system operated by Madera County.

Methodology

The survey was conducted within the Madera County Maintenance District #33 from March 27 through March 31, 2008. Bilingual (English and Spanish) staff from the County of Madera and Self-Help Enterprises (SHE) conducted the door to door survey during a weekday morning, weekday afternoon and early evening and a Saturday. A Madera County Maintenance District #33 Boundary Map and list of water customer's addresses was utilized to identify dwellings in the District and keep track of those dwellings visited and successfully surveyed. Staff determined that there is a total of 193 housing units in the survey area. SHE surveyors visited every dwelling and determined that 23 of the homes were vacant. Surveyors received household size and income responses from 125 households or 73% of the occupied 170 units.

Once complete, the survey data was collated and analyzed.

Results

The average household size is 4.0 persons with household size ranging from 1 to 14 persons. The District's population is extrapolated at 680 persons based on this average and 170 occupied units. Just over 47 percent of the community's homes are owner occupied.

Ninety percent of the community is considered as low income with 72 percent considered very low income by HUD's standards utilizing the State Department of Housing and Community Development web site for a listing of Madera County income limits. The overcrowded conditions in many homes indicates that more than one family shares a dwelling. In Fairmead's case it is easy to see that multiple families' incomes make up the overall household income in many homes. (See attached survey results)

Data are based on a sample and are subject to sampling variability. The degree of uncertainty for an estimate arising from sampling variability is represented through the use of a margin of error. The value shown here is the 90 percent margin of error. The margin of error can be interpreted roughly as providing a 90 percent probability that the interval defined by the estimate minus the margin of error and the estimate plus the margin of error (the lower and upper confidence bounds) contains the true value. In addition to sampling variability, the ACS estimates are subject to nonsampling error (for a discussion of nonsampling variability, see Accuracy of the Data). The effect of nonsampling error is not represented in these tables.

There were changes in the edit between 2009 and 2010 regarding Supplemental Security Income (SSI) and Social Security. The changes in the edit loosened restrictions on disability requirements for receipt of SSI resulting in an increase in the total number of SSI recipients in the American Community Survey. The changes also loosened restrictions on possible reported monthly amounts in Social Security income resulting in higher Social Security aggregate amounts. These results more closely match administrative counts compiled by the Social Security Administration.

Workers include members of the Armed Forces and civilians who were at work last week.

Industry codes are 4-digit codes and are based on the North American Industry Classification System 2007. The Industry categories adhere to the guidelines issued in Clarification Memorandum No. 2, "NAICS Alternate Aggregation Structure for Use By U.S. Statistical Agencies," issued by the Office of Management and Budget.

Census occupation codes are 4-digit codes and are based on the Standard Occupational Classification (SOC). The Census occupation codes for 2010 and later years are based on the 2010 revision of the SOC. To allow for the creation of 2007-2011 and 2009-2011 tables, occupation data in the multiyear files (2007-2011 and 2009-2011) were recoded to 2011 Census occupation codes. We recommend using caution when comparing data coded using 2011 Census occupation codes with data coded using Census occupation codes prior to 2010. While the 2007-2011 American Community Survey (ACS) data generally reflect the December 2009 Office of Management and Budget (OMB) definitions of metropolitan and micropolitan statistical areas; in certain instances the names, codes, and boundaries of the principal cities shown in ACS tables may differ from the OMB definitions due to differences in the effective dates of the geographic entities.

Estimates of urban and rural population, housing units, and characteristics reflect boundaries of urban areas defined based on Census 2000 data. Boundaries for urban areas have not been updated since Census 2000. As a result, data for urban and rural areas from the ACS do not necessarily reflect the results of ongoing urbanization.
