Below is a statement explaining why the Borrego Water District is an eligible applicant for an Integrated Regional Water Management (IRWM) Planning Grant.

As described in Attachment 1, the Borrego Water District (BWD) is applying for this Planning Grant on behalf of the Regional Water Management Group (RWMG) of the Anza Borrego Desert (ABD) IRWM Program. BWD is an eligible applicant as described below:

Local Agency and Statutory Authority

BWD is a local agency as defined in Appendix B of the Proposition 84 IRWM Grant Program Guidelines. BWD was established in 1962 as a California Water District in accordance with Section 216 of the Public Utilities Code. In 2002, BWD adopted a groundwater management plan in accordance with Assembly Bill 3030 (AB 3030), a process which led BWD to obtain authority to conduct groundwater replenishment activities.

Legal Authority to Enter into a Grant Agreement

BWD has legal authority to enter into a grant agreement with the State of California. Per the approved Region Acceptance Process (RAP) application, the RWMG selected BWD to submit grant applications to the State on behalf of the RWMG parties (refer to Attachment 1). Resolution 2012-01-02 authorizes BWD to submit this ABD IRWM Planning Grant Proposal and execute an agreement with the State of California for IRWM planning activities (refer to Attachment 1).

Legal Agreements among Partners and/or Organizations

The RWMG parties are in the process of developing a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) to formalize their commitments to the ABD IRWM Program. As of the date of this proposal, a MOU has been drafted by BWD and provided to the County of San Diego and the Resource Conservation District of Greater San Diego County (RCD) for their review and input. Exhibit A to this attachment is a copy of the draft MOU along with a letter from the County of San Diego indicating their willingness to work on drafting an MOU. Further, Exhibit A to this attachment also includes a copy of meeting minutes from an RCD meeting, which demonstrates their unanimous approval in participating in the Anza Borrego Desert IRWM process. Exhibit B of this document provides details regarding the history of the ABD Region, which were submitted previously to the California Department of Water Resources in December of 2011.

Exhibit A

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN BORREGO WATER DISTRICT, THE COUNTY OF SAN DIEGO, AND THE RESOURCE CONSERVATION DISTRICT OF GREATER SAN DIEGO COUNTY FOR DEVELOPMENT OF AN INTEGRATED REGIONAL WATER MANAGEMENT PLAN

This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) dated _____, 2012 is entered into between the Borrego Water District, County of San Diego, and Resource Conservation District of Greater San Diego County (collectively known as Partners) for the purpose of coordinating water resources planning activities undertaken by the agencies for the Anza Borrego Desert Integrated Regional Water Management Group (hereinafter "IRWMG").

WHEREAS, each Partner has taken formal action committing to the creation of an Integrated Regional Water Resources Plan for the Anza Borrego Desert Region ("IRWMP"); and

WHEREAS, it is in the interests if the Partners and the region served by the Partners that these water resources are responsibly managed and conserved to the extent feasible; and

WHEREAS, the Partners wish to coordinate their long term water supply planning efforts in accordance with Section 10531 of the Integrated Regional Water Management Planning Act of 2002 and Division 43 of the Safe Water, Water Quality and Supply, Flood Control, River and Coastal Protection Bond Act of 2006 ("Acts"); and

WHEREAS, the Partners anticipate the potential need for future agreements on specific projects or programs and with other affected agencies to further coordinate long term water supply planning.

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties hereto mutually covenant and agree with each other as follows:

1. AUTHORITY OF PARTNERS

1.1. The Borrego Water District is a California Water District organized and operating under California Water Code section 34000, et seq. and has statutory authority over water supply in the Borrego Valley Watershed area.

1.2. The County of San Diego is a political subdivision of the State of California with statutory authority for the regulation of land use in the County of San Diego.

1.3. The Resource Conservation District of Greater San Diego County is a special district organized under Division 9 of the California Public Resources Code with authority to conduct research and to advise and assist other public agencies in the

areas of land use planning, soil and water conservation, wildlife habitat restoration, control of exotic plant species and watershed restoration.

2. DEFINITIONS

The abbreviations and capitalized words and phrases used in this MOU shall have the following meanings:

2.1 **Acts** means Section 10531 of the Integrated Regional Water Management Planning Act of 2002 and the California Water Code Division 43, known as the Safe Water, Water Quality and Supply, Flood Control, River and Coastal Protection Bond Act of 2006.

2.2 **Anza Borrego Desert Integrated Water Management Region (or Region)** means the area depicted on Attachment A, which includes the Borrego Valley Watershed area, and the portion of San Diego County that lies in the Colorado River Hydrologic Basin Region.

2.3 **IRWMP** means Integrated Regional Water Management Plan.

2.4 **IRWMG** means the Anza Borrego Desert Integrated Regional Water Management Group.

3. PURPOSES AND GOALS OF THIS MOU

3.1. Purposes and Goals:

3.1.1 This MOU is to memorialize the intent of the Partners to coordinate and share information concerning water supply planning programs and projects and other information, and to improve and maintain overall communication among the Partners. It is anticipated that coordination and information sharing among the Partners will assist the agencies in achieving their respective missions to the overall well-being of the region. Coordination and information sharing shall focus on issues of common interest as described in Section 3.2.

3.1.2 The execution of this MOU by the Partners shall constitute the formation of a Regional Water Management Group consisting of the Partners, in accordance with the Acts. The Regional Water Management Group shall be named the Anza Borrego Desert Integrated Regional Water Management Group (IRWMG).

3.1.3 It is the goal of the Partners to prepare and adopt an IRWMP for the Region and to implement projects and programs individually or jointly in groups that address issues of common interest, as the group so identifies.

3.2. Common Issues and Interest:

3.2.1 Water supply programs and projects that may provide mutual benefits in improving water supply reliability and/or water quality.

3.2.2 Coordination of near-term and long-term water supply planning activities.

3.2.3 Development of regional approaches to problem-solving and issues resolution as well as to further common interest.

3.3 Future Agreements by Partners: The Partners acknowledge that by virtue of commitments and intentions stated within this MOU, the need for certain other considerations that will facilitate the preparation of an IRWMP for the Region will likely emerge. These include and are not limited to:

3.3.1 Developing a Scope of Work

3.3.2 Determining the cost sharing of projects

3.3.3 Establishing methods for project management

3.3.4 Establishing a project timeline

4. JOINT PLANNING FOR PROJECTS AND PROGRAMS

4.1 Projects and Programs Covered by this MOU: It is the intent of the Partners that they coordinate and collaborate to address the common issues identified. The Partners may develop and implement projects and programs individually or jointly in groups of two or more, or enter into additional agreements in furthering those goals. Applicable projects and programs include, but are not limited to the following:

4.1.1 Water conservation programs and other demand management programs.

4.1.2 Water recycling, desalination, groundwater basin management, and water quality improvement programs and projects.

4.1.3. Water banking, conjunctive use and transfer arrangements.

4.1.4 Storage development to improve system reliability, efficiencies, and flexibility.

4.1.5 Project and program planning and development to solicit external funding.

4.1.6 Other meritorious projects or programs consistent with the purposes of this MOU.

4.2 Communication and Coordination: It is the intent of the Partners to meet on a monthly basis in order to carry out the purposes and goals of this MOU. The frequency and location of meetings are subject to the discretion of the Partners and may be changed when appropriate.

5. GENERAL PROVISIONS GOVERNING THE MOU

5.1 Term: The term of this MOU is indefinite. Any Partner may withdraw from the MOU by written notice given at least 45 days prior to the effective date.

5.2 Construction of Terms: This MOU is for the sole benefit of the Partners and shall not be construed as granting rights to any person other than the Partners or imposing obligations on a Partner to any person other than another Partner.

5.3 Good Faith: Each Partner shall use its best efforts and work wholeheartedly and in good faith for the expeditious completion of the objectives of this MOU and the satisfactory performance of its terms.

5.4 Rights of the Partners and Constituencies: This MOU does not contemplate the Partners taking any action that would adversely affect the rights of any of the Partners; or adversely affect the customers or constituencies of any of the Partners.

5.5 This document and participation in the IRWVG are nonbinding, and in no way suggest that a Partner may not continue its own planning and undertake efforts to secure project funding from any source.

5.6 It is expected that Partners will contribute the personnel and financial resources necessary to develop the IRWMP.

CALL TO ORDER: President Liz DeSouza called the meeting to order at 3:07 p.m. upon establishment of a quorum. Self-introductions were made.

3. **PUBLIC COMMENT:** None
4. **CONSENT CALENDAR –** Motion/second (DKN and HH) to accept the consent calendar as amended; approved unanimously.

 - 4-5 Item 7-3 audit: Nadine Scott requested and Board approved reinstatement of language re: auditor's recommendation for in-house bookkeeping position (see amended minutes of April 2009).
5. **STAFF REPORTS**

District Manager – Marty Leavitt (see report attached): Leavitt noted that most staff has recently successfully relocated to the new Lakeside facility. Phones and internet connections are being installed. Six staff remain in El Cajon office pending completion of warehouse office refurbishing; we have arranged to remain on month-to-month lease through end of July if needed, but it is hoped that we will be completely moved into the new facility by end of June. The Southern California-Baja Regional meeting and tour met with approval from nearly 30 attendees (see CARCD report). Reminder about upcoming Open House at the new RCD offices, 11769 Waterhill Road, May 29th, 10-noon; Supervisor Dianne Jacob is Keynote with Assemblyman Joel Anderson invited to speak.
6. **OTHER AGENCY, DIRECTOR AND ASSOCIATION REPORTS**
 - 6-1 **RC&D Report:** - DeSouza attended the quarterly meeting of South Coast RC&D. The program coordinator has been reassigned and will be replaced by NRCS. The RC&D is looking for ways to raise funding for projects.
 - 6-2 **CARCD Report** – N. Scott: Scott noted that the recent Southern California-Baja Regional meeting hosted by RCDGSDC was excellent and well attended. She will not need to be replaced as regional chair because she has resigned her position as CARCD Treasurer.
 - 6-3 **Director Activity Reports:** Hilliker noted that Head Start has expressed interest in possible use of the RCD's warehouse and/or office space as available. The RCD Conservation scholarship applications are being reviewed by Education Committee and the winners will be announced.
 - 6-4 **Tenant Improvement Ad Hoc Committee Report:** Nasland recommended disbanding the ad hoc committee; however, the Board took no action at this time. He noted that the

- 6-5 **NRCS Report** – Danielle Hirsch reported in place of Cori Butler. WHIP is still moving forward, ½ to 1/3 completed. Invasive removal plays a large part. 14 2009 applications were received, including four grazing and 5 hedgerows for habitat, five invasive removal projects, 4 of which are with US Fish & Wildlife Service. EQIP has received \$300,000 in 2009 applications and expect more since the application period has been reopened.
- 6-6 **LAFCO Report** – Humphrey: No report due to no meeting since the last report.



RE: IRWM Regional Acceptance Process for Anza Borrego Desert IRWMG

The Borrego Water District began working to secure a position in the San Diego County IRWMG in 2006. After attending several of the stakeholder meetings, the District was politely asked to leave the group for geographical reasons (attachment A). When confronted, the County IRWM representative, offered to assist Borrego in forming a second County group which would better meet our geological area requirements. Several attempts were made to join in the early programs with Coachella Valley and Imperial County but were unsuccessful, this time due to political boundary considerations. With the assistance of our consultant Bill Mills, the District was able to locate and secure support from the Resource Conservation District of Greater San Diego County and the County of San Diego, through the Department of Planning and Land Use who had direct control over land use and associated water regulations (attachment B).

Our original submittal to the DWR featured the Borrego Valley Watershed area only (attachment C). After meeting with the DWR through an RAP interview, it was agreed for the area boundary to be expanded to better suit the "regional" requirement of the process. The area was expanded to include the portion of San Diego County that lies in the Colorado River Hydrologic Basin Region. The new area combined the Borrego Valley watershed which extends into Riverside County and the area of San Diego County east of the Tecate Divide. The expanded area included the entire Anza-Borrego Desert State Park, Ocotillo Wells State Vehicular Recreation Area, four public water purveyors and five Indian Reservations. The updated boundary and location of the public water systems are featured on the regional map (attachment D). All of these groups have been approached by the Borrego Water District to be included in the program. The IRWMG continues to outreach to these groups and has had some success in recruiting these regional stakeholders but due to various reasons, some groups have declined to participate. The ABD_IRWMG will continue to pursue this level of outreach and the plan work continues.

Dear Mr. Fogarty:

I am responding to your letter of September 7, 2006, requesting inclusion of the Borrego Valley in the planning area of the San Diego Integrated Regional Water Management (IRWM) Plan. As you are aware, the development of this Plan, currently scheduled for adoption in mid-2007, has been in progress since late 2004. Responsibility for its completion currently resides with a Regional Water Management Group (RWMG) which is a partnership of the San Diego County Water Authority, the City of San Diego, and the County of San Diego (County). Although we find merit in your request to be included in an IRWM Plan process, please understand that including Borrego Valley in the San Diego IRWM Plan requires the concurrence of all three RWMG member agencies.

An issue of critical importance in initiating the San Diego IRWM effort was to define the geographic area to be addressed in the Plan. After careful consideration, the RWMG determined that this should include the area of intersection of San Diego County and California Regional Water Quality Control Board (RWQCB) Region Nine. County staff presented your letter and issue of whether the IRWM Plan boundary should be modified to include the Borrego Valley at a meeting of the RWMG on September 25, 2006. At that meeting, it was decided that the boundaries of the San Diego IRWM Plan should not be adjusted at this time. The primary reasons for this decision are as follows:

The hydrology and physical geography of the Borrego Valley are distinctly different from the IRWM Plan area. A defining characteristic of the IRWM Plan region is the inclusion of all westward draining watersheds. The Borrego Valley is located in a separate hydrologic region with vastly different climates, runoff characteristics, and hydrology.


Water supply and wastewater patterns and practices are very different between these two areas. Imported water is the predominant source of supply within the San Diego IRWM Region, and the imported water is supplied by a single wholesale imported water agency – The San Diego County Water Authority. This commonality of water supply and wastewater patterns requires that the Region work together to manage water resources efficiently and to develop a diverse reliable water supply for the Region.

Modifying the IRWM Region at this late date would sidetrack efforts to complete and adopt the Plan on its current schedule. The Plan must be adopted in mid-2007 to enable the Region to apply and compete for State funding under Propositions 50 and 84.

The Borrego Valley presents water supply, water quality, and ecological issues and challenges that are generally quite distinct from those of the San Diego IRWM Region. During the RWMG meeting, it was suggested that the Borrego Water District approach the Imperial Irrigation District (IID) to coordinate an Integrated Regional Water Management Plan within the Colorado River Basin.

Again, please understand the County does not have the authority to determine whether or not Borrego Valley is included within the San Diego IRWM Plan Region. 


