

## Attachment 2 Eligible Applicant Documentation

1. Is the Applicant a local public agency as defined in CWC 10701(a)? What is the Statutory or other legal authority under which the applicant was formed and is authorized to operate?

Yes, the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District (MPWMD) was formed June 6, 1978 under the enabling act West's California Water Code, Appendix Chapters 118-1 to 118-901. The district serves a population of 112,000 located in Carmel-by-the-Sea, Del-Rey Oaks, Monterey, Pacific Grove, Seaside, Sand City, Monterey Peninsula Airport District, and portions of Unincorporated Monterey County including Pebble Beach and Carmel Valley.

The District enabling act defines the mission statement of the District as to manage, augment, and protect water resources for the benefit of the community and the environment. Specific tasks that are outlined in the District act are to;

- Augment the water supply through integrated management of ground and surface water resources,
- Promote water conservation,
- Promote water reuse and reclamation of storm and wastewater, and
- Foster the scenic values, environmental quality, native vegetation, fish and wildlife, and recreation on the Monterey Peninsula and in the Carmel River basin.

Areas where these tasks are practically applied to the Monterey Peninsula are the oversight and coordination of;

- Local, integrated control of resources, including groundwater,
- Computer modeling of water resources system,
- Hydrologic monitoring (stream gaging, ground water monitoring),
- Metering program for all non Cal-Am wells,
- Water connection permits,
- Allocation of water to jurisdictions,
- Water conservation ordinances and inspections,
- Determine drought emergency and impose rationing program,
- Carmel River mitigation programs (fish, riparian, lagoon),
- River works (erosion control),
- Approving new water distribution systems and expansions,
- Financing of Pebble Beach Reclamation project,
- Sales of reclaimed water, and  
Planning, implementation, and operation of conjunctive use water resources projects.

2. Does the Applicant have the legal authority to enter into a grant agreement with the State of California?

Yes, MPWMD has the legal authority to enter into Bonds and Grants. MPWMD is currently in a grant agreement with DWR for the IRWMP Planning 2011 cycle.

3. Describe any legal agreements among partner agencies and/or organizations that ensure performance of the project and tracking funds?

MPWMD and California American (CalAm) have an operational MOU detailing the shared operation and maintenance of Aquifer Storage and Recovery (ASR) Program. However, the scope of work included in this grant application does not require CalAm to be involved so all of the funds will be tracked by MPWMD.
