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Workshops on Water Conditions and Drought Preparedness

Topics to be covered include implementation of the Governor's Advisory Drought Planning Panel's recommendations, the weather outlook, potential water supply conditions if next year is dry, and actions water suppliers are taking to improve their drought preparedness.

Water year 2001 was California's first dry year following six years of wet to average conditions. Runoff in key Sierra Nevada watersheds - the source of much of California's agricultural and urban water supply - was about 45 percent to 70 percent of average. As a result, the Department's State Water Project contractors and the Bureau of Reclamation's Central Valley Project agricultural export contractors were allocated less than half their requested deliveries. Water users in the Bureau's Klamath Project, one of the State's driest areas in 2001, received only minimal deliveries.

The impacts of a dry 2001 were minimized for most other large water systems by generally good storage in reservoirs and groundwater basins, the legacy of prior wet years. A dry 2002 will result in more widespread impacts due to depletion of stored water during 2001.
