

Eligible Applicant Documentation

- Is the applicant a local agency, joint powers authorities, or nonprofit organization, as defined in Appendix B? Please explain.

West Basin Municipal Water District (“District”), the applicant, is a local, public agency.

- What is the statutory or other legal authority under which the applicant was formed and is authorized to operate?

Under the provisions of Section 3 of the Act of the Legislature of the State of California, entitled: “An act to provide for the incorporation and organization and management of municipal water districts, and to provide for the acquisition and construction by said districts of waterworks, and for the acquisition of all property necessary therefor, and also to provide for the distribution and sale of water by said districts,” approved May 1911, as amended (Act 5243 of Deering’s General Laws).

- Does the applicant have legal authority to enter into a grant agreement with the State of California?

The District has the legal authority to enter into a grant agreement with the State of California pursuant to California Water Code §§ 71950, 71952, 71720, 71722, and 71723.

- Describe any legal agreements among partner agencies and/or organizations that ensure performance of the project and tracking of funds.

For the partnerships included in the Project, the District has legal agreements with Metropolitan Water District of Southern California (MWD) through their Member Agency Allocations funds and the South Bay Environmental Services Center (SBESC). These agreements will ensure performance success and West Basin will track the funds spent on this project.

Shown Below is West Basin’s agreement with MWD (Attachment 1). Through this agreement, West Basin is able to access the incentive funding for the indoor / outdoor surveys. The rebates for the high efficiency clothes washers and high efficiency toilets will be provided by MWD’s regional rebate vendor, EGIA. (Attachment 2)

Since 2006, West Basin has held a partnership agreement with the SBESC. (Attachment 3). If awarded funding from DWR, West Basin will amend their current agreement to include the customer service component of this project. The SBESC has verbally agreed to provide these additional services. The SBESC also promotes the Southern California Edison (SCE) and Southern California Gas (SCG) rebates. The SBESC is currently under contract with those two utilities to promote and track the rebates for them. Through West Basin's CLEAN Project, the SBESC will track the energy rebates that it assists with and provide West Basin with monthly reports.

WATER CONSERVATION FUNDING AGREEMENT
BETWEEN
THE METROPOLITAN WATER DISTRICT OF SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA
AND
West Basin Municipal Water District Agreement No. 70040

The Metropolitan Water District of Southern California (Metropolitan) issues Addenda to provide the West Basin Municipal Water District (Member Agency) with updates or changes to the residential incentive program (Residential Program) that occur after the start of this agreement. This addendum is effective June 1, 2014, and supersedes previous addendums, exhibits, and forms under this agreement.

This addendum includes the following items:

1. **Chronology of Addendums** (Page 3 & 4) – List of all past addendums including issue date and authorization for program changes in each addendum.
2. **Residential Incentive List** (Page 5 & 6) – List of devices and other incentives in the Regional Residential Program and eligible incentives in the MWD-Funded/Member Agency Administered Program. Funding for sprinkler nozzles includes Department of the Interior Grant Agreement No. R12AP35351. Member Agency must comply with all terms and conditions of the grant.
3. **Accept or Forfeit Funds for MWD-Funded/Member Agency Administered Incentive Program** (Page 7) – This form provides the total Member Agency initial reserved amount for the MWD-Funded/Member Agency Administered Incentive Program for Fiscal Year 2014/15. Member Agency must select Option 1, 2, or 3, by checking the appropriate box, sign, date and return this form to Metropolitan by September 30, 2014.
4. **Regional Incentives Not Allowed in Member Agency's Service Area** (Page 8) – This form allows the Member Agency to not allow Metropolitan's regional incentives in their service area. If applicable, Member Agency must check each specific device not allowed, sign, date, and return this form to Metropolitan.
5. **Member Agency Supplemental Funding Authorization** (Page 9 & 10) – This form allows Member Agency to authorize supplemental funding for device incentives through the Regional Program. To provide supplemental incentive funding, Member Agency must complete, sign, date, and return the form to Metropolitan. If the effective date of Member Agency's supplemental funding is July 1, 2014, the authorization form must be submitted to Metropolitan by no later than June 15, 2014.
6. **Member Agency Administered Project Pre-Approval Request** (Page 11) – This form allows Member Agency to submit a device-based or customized project to Metropolitan for pre-approval. Member Agency may use the continuation check box for a previously approved

Qualifying Products

Indoors:

Together, toilets and clothes washers account for approximately 45% of the water used inside your home. Please contact your local agency to verify the funding availability.

Note: Some local water agencies add funding to the baseline rebate amount. Consult the [Estimate Your Rebate](#) feature to find out if your water agency is on the list.

High-Efficiency Clothes Washers



Use 55% less water than standard clothes washers. Less water means less energy needed for water heating, lowering your energy bill too. Rebates start at \$85 (for washers purchased on or after July 1, 2013).

High-Efficiency Toilets (HETs)

Effective June 1, 2014, High Efficiency Toilet rebates are being offered, for a limited time, starting at \$100.00 per toilet. HET rebate applications may be submitted via the standard online program application located on [Get Your Rebate](#). Be sure to correctly select your water agency.

Outdoors:

Up to 70% of California's entire residential water supply is applied to home landscapes, yet many landscapes are overwatered due to sprinkler controllers that are not programmed properly. Some Southern Californians are now using smart sprinkler controllers that water based on plant needs. These controllers automatically adjust for changing weather conditions, thereby reducing waste and runoff. Learn about rebates for weather-based irrigation controllers below.

Rotating Sprinkler Nozzles



- Apply water more slowly and uniformly to prevent over-watering and encourage healthy plant growth;
- Use 20% less water than conventional spray heads!
- Rebates start at \$4/nozzle; minimum quantity is 15 nozzles.

Rain Barrels



Collecting and re-using rainwater from gutters and downspouts for lawns and gardens minimizes the amount of water flowing into your storm drains, sewer systems and local waterways. Plants and microbes prefer rainwater because it is naturally "soft" and free of chlorine, fluoride and other chemicals.

Soil Moisture Sensor Systems



A soil moisture sensor measures soil moisture content in the active root zone on your property. The sensor should be placed in a location that best represents the overall soil moisture condition of the site, and must be connected to an irrigation system controller that accepts a signal from the sensor. A measurement is taken before each scheduled irrigation event, and the irrigation controller bypasses the scheduled run cycle if the soil moisture is above a certain threshold level defined by the user.

Turf Removal

- Replace irrigated lawn with drought tolerant plants or other approved landscape options

PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT NO. W2517
between
WEST BASIN MUNICIPAL WATER DISTRICT
and
SOUTH BAY CITIES COUNCIL OF GOVERNMENTS
for
WATER EFFICIENCY PROGRAMS PARTNERSHIP

The West Basin Municipal Water District, herein "DISTRICT", and South Bay Cities Council of Governments, herein "CONSULTANT", agree as follows:

SECTION 1 - PURPOSE

Under this Agreement, the CONSULTANT shall provide Water Efficiency Programs Outreach and Marketing Services.

SECTION 2 - SCOPE OF SERVICES

The CONSULTANT shall, in good workmanlike and professional manner and at its own expense, furnish all of the technical, administrative, professional and other labor, all supplies and materials, equipment, printing, vehicles, transportation, office space and facilities necessary to perform and complete the work and provide the services as set forth in Exhibit "A" of this Agreement.

SECTION 3 - TERM

The term of this Agreement shall be for a period of one (1) year commencing September 1, 2014 and concluding August 31, 2015.

SECTION 4 - ACCEPTANCE

This Agreement constitutes the DISTRICT's offer to the CONSULTANT. Unless the CONSULTANT notifies the DISTRICT, in writing to the contrary, the commencement of performance required by this offer shall be conclusive evidence of the CONSULTANT's approval of, and consent to the terms and conditions of this Agreement herein contained.

SECTION 5 - TERMINATION

(a) The DISTRICT may terminate or cancel this Agreement, in whole or in part, without liability to the DISTRICT, if CONSULTANT fails to perform in accordance
