Drought Legislation Senate Bills 103 and 104

- ▶ Appropriated \$687.4 million
 - ▶ \$581.5 million to DWR
 - ▶ \$472.5 million in Proposition 84 IRWM funds, includes
 - ▶ \$200 Million to be expedited for drought projects
 - ▶ \$272.5 Million for IRWM projects
 - ▶ Up to \$21.8 Million to “backfill” 2014 Implementation Grant awards
 - ▶ Appropriated all remaining Proposition 84 IRWM funds
 - ▶ \$77 million in Proposition 1E funds for multi-purpose flood projects
 - ▶ \$30 million in Greenhouse Gas Reduction Funds, includes
 - ▶ \$20 million for Water-Energy Grant Program
 - ▶ \$1 million for Save Our Water campaign
 - ▶ \$1 million for California Statewide Groundwater Elevation Monitoring



Executive Order 1-17-2014 Order #6

- ▶ The Department of Water Resources and the Water Board will accelerate funding for water supply enhancement projects that can break ground this year and will explore if any existing unspent funds can be repurposed to enable near-term water conservation projects.



Executive Order 4-25-2014 Order #5

- ▶ All state agencies that distribute funding for projects that impact water resources, including groundwater resources, will require recipients of future financial assistance to have appropriate conservation and efficiency programs in place.



Water Energy Grant Program

- ▶ \$19M Local Assistance
- ▶ Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund
- ▶ Residential, commercial, or institutional water efficiency programs or projects
- ▶ Projects must:
 - ▶ Reduce greenhouse gas emissions
 - ▶ Reduce water use
 - ▶ Reduce energy use



Eligible Grant Recipients

- ▶ Local agencies
 - ▶ Joint powers authorities
 - ▶ Non-profit organizations
- 



Schedule

- ▶ Public Scoping meetings
 - ▶ May 9 - Fresno
 - ▶ May 12 - Sacramento
 - ▶ Purpose: seek public input on program concepts
- ▶ By July 1 - Post Draft Guidelines & PSP for comment
 - ▶ Legislative mandate



Program Authorization

- ▶ Eligible Project
 - ▶ Residential, commercial, or institutional water efficiency programs or projects
 - ▶ Agricultural water conservation NOT eligible
 - ▶ Department of Food & Ag - \$10 million in GGR funds
 - ▶ http://www.cdfa.ca.gov/EnvironmentalStewardship/H2O_EandE.html
- ▶ Projects must do all of the following
 - ▶ Reduce greenhouse gas emissions
 - ▶ Reduce water use
 - ▶ Reduce energy use



Example Water Conservation Projects

- ▶ Residential Rebate programs:
 - ▶ Shower head, sink aerator, toilet replacement
- ▶ Landscape irrigation retrofits; cash for grass
- ▶ Commercial/Institutional facilities retrofits
 - ▶ Laundries
 - ▶ Kitchens
 - ▶ Steam systems
- ▶ Leak repair
- ▶ Other suggestions?


Disadvantaged Communities

- ▶ Health and Safety Code § 39711
- ▶ Based on geographic, socioeconomic, public health, and environmental hazard criteria
 - ▶ Disproportionately affected by environmental pollution and other hazards that can lead to negative public health effects, exposure, or environmental degradation
 - ▶ Concentrations of people that are of low income, high unemployment, low levels of homeownership, high rent burden, sensitive populations, or low levels of educational attainment
- ▶ CalEPA identify
 - ▶ CalEnviroScreen 2.0 – Top 20% Highest Scores

Proposal Evaluation

- ▶ Have applicants present water and energy savings
- ▶ DWR determine GHG reductions
 - ▶ No standard calculator
 - ▶ Ease burden on applicants
- ▶ Cost Effectiveness
 - ▶ B/C Ratio?
 - ▶ For example:
$$\frac{\text{Water Saved} + \text{Energy Saved} + \text{GHG Reductions}}{\text{Project Costs}}$$
 - ▶ OR
$$\frac{\text{Water Saved}}{\text{Project Costs}}$$



Application Content

Applicants will need to:

- ▶ Address eligibility requirements
 - ▶ Present water savings
 - ▶ Present energy savings
 - ▶ Present info to estimate GHG reduction
 - ▶ Submit a Work Plan, Schedule, and Budget
- 

Proposal Evaluation Systems

- ▶ Quantitative – Point based scoring system
- ▶ Qualitative – ranking system
 - ▶ Relative ranking/Comparative Analysis
 - ▶ More subjective
 - ▶ For example:

Project	Water Savings	Energy Savings	GHG Reduction
1	High	High	High
2	Medium	High	Medium
3	High	Medium	Medium
4	Low	Low	Low



Maximum Grant Amount Matching Funds

- ▶ Legislation did not establish a maximum amount
- ▶ Possible options:
 - ▶ No maximum – could seek up to \$19 M
 - ▶ Or something less
 - ▶ 19 grants @ \$1 M
 - ▶ 9.5 grants @ \$2 M
 - ▶ DWR considering \$2.5 M (7.6 grants)
 - ▶ Seeking input
- ▶ Legislation did not mandate cost share
 - ▶ Require some percentage?
 - ▶ Waiver for disadvantaged communities
 - ▶ Preference/Points if cost share provided?

- ▶ *August 2014 – Conduct 2 Public Meetings*

- ▶ *December 2014 – Applications due*
 - ▶ *Assuming a 60 day application preparation period*
- ▶ *March 2015 – Draft Awards*
- ▶ *April/May 2015 – Announce Final Awards*

Notice of Funding Availability for Interim Emergency Drinking Water

INTRODUCTION

On March 1, 2014, Governor Brown approved a \$687.4-million emergency drought relief package to take effect immediately. As a result of the Governor's action, the State Water Resources Control Board (State Water Board) approved \$4 million in funding from the Cleanup and Abatement Account (CAA) to provide interim replacement drinking water for economically disadvantaged communities with contaminated water supplies.

In an effort to distribute funds as quickly and efficiently as possible, the State Water Board will coordinate with the Regional Water Quality Control Boards, the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) district offices, the Office of Emergency Services, and other stakeholders (e.g., environmental justice groups, community assistance groups, etc.) to identify those disadvantaged communities that are most at-risk and would benefit from financial assistance.
