

Comments to Emergency Rulemaking File #2010-1207-01E due 4.18.2011 Industrial Water

We question why an Urban Water Management Plan is required, if industrial water is not considered significant in water planning.

Reliance for conservation is on the Single Family Dwelling occupants and not distributed for fairness.

In the draft LADWP 2010 Urban Water Management Plan, they state:

“Over the 25 year forecast period, industrial growth is expected to decline and experience a subtle annual negative growth of -0.4 percent, while commercial employment is expected to increase by about 0.5 percent annually.”

The Southern California Leadership Committee expects to have manufacturing growth in Southern California to meet economic needs.

We do not have a match here.

Sector analysis is needed more than ever to meet any type of economic growth. The burden will be on supply, not on non-disclosure. The fairness is to have that supply for all, not just for some.

Fracking must be taken into consideration and any new process that uses substantial amounts of water.

Large supplies like the LADWP need to account to all sectors. So far, the burden is entirely on the Single Family Dwelling ratepayer.

The NPDES permits need to be under consideration.
