**Comments on the first volume
of the Water Plan due
in less than three weeks**

The 45-day comment periods are underway for each of the volumes in the [public review draft](#) of *California Water Plan Update 2013*. Each volume has a different comment deadline; Volume 1, The Strategic Plan, Monday, Nov. 18; Volume 2, Regional Reports, Monday, Dec. 9; Volume 3, Resource Management Strategies, Monday, Dec. 2. A [reviewer's guide](#) provides instructions on the different methods for submitting comments.

The grants are used to help local governments and regional agencies develop plans that reduce greenhouse gases and achieve other sustainability goals. The [SGC meeting](#) will be Tuesday, Nov. 5, in Sacramento.
